HPV IMMUNISATION: TIME IS RUNNING OUT

CHANGES LEADING TO THE IMMUNISATION PROGRAMME

On 26th October 2007, Health Secretary Alan Johnson announced the introduction of a human papilloma virus (HPV) immunisation programme to routinely vaccinate girls aged 12-13 years against cervical cancer, starting from September 2008.

The announcement signalled the DH's sustained commitment to public health. It is anticipated that the routine programme could cost up to £100 million a year, with the two-year catch-up campaign, scheduled for 2009/10 and 2010/11, costing a further £200 million.

Alan Johnson commented at the time: "Prevention is always better than cure and this vaccine will prevent many women from catching the human papilloma virus in the first place, potentially saving around 400 lives a year."

Primary Care Trusts will plan how to deliver the vaccination programme locally. JCVI and the DH have advised that implementation would be most efficiently delivered through schools. At the announcement, DH Director of Immunisation Professor David Salisbury said; "The benefits of introducing this vaccine into the national immunisation programme will be felt by women and their families for generations to come. The vaccine protects against the viruses that cause about 70% of cervical cancers. We will work closely with PCTs to ensure the success of this ambitious programme that combines routine and catch-up immunisation and we will consult with all groups who may play a part".

WHAT'S RECOMMENDED?

As of September 2008, PCTs and LA stakeholders will work together to:

- Routinely offer the HPV vaccine to females aged 12-13 (school year 8) on an annual basis
- Offer the HPV vaccine to females aged 16-18 in autumn 2009
- Offer the HPV vaccine to females aged 15-17 in autumn 2010
- Deliver the programme primarily through schools with alternative settings available for those that miss the school schedule (e.g. additional community clinics and GPs)
- Ensure targeting of those in the population not in mainstream education
- Develop a robust public health awareness campaign to run alongside the vaccination programme
- Develop a communication plan for programme implementation

WORKSHOP AIMS

This free workshop aims to;

- Highlight the reasons behind the DH's decision to introduce the vaccination programme
- Provide an overview of HPV epidemiology

- Summarise DH recommendations
- Discuss potential local barriers to implementation
- Examine the roles of the various stakeholders
- Share best practice and advice for planning and rollout of the campaign
- Access a Stakeholder Action Plan and Timeline to guide delegates through the next steps.

All stakeholders involved in HPV immunisation now have less than four months to prepare for implementation. Many PCTs have started and are well down the line in setting commissioning specifications, engaging local stakeholders and discussing logistics.

They can discuss local progress, obstacles and solutions during the syndicate sessions and use guidance on service implementation to help with their PCT's plans for the HPV Immunisation programme.
